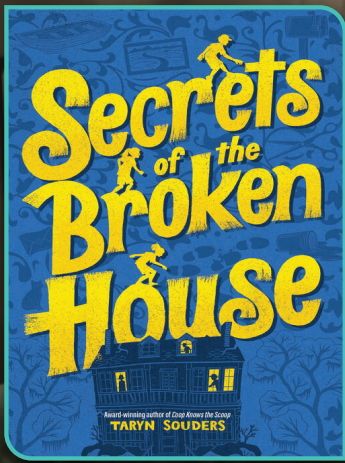




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Dear Reader!

One of my favorite parts of writing this story was creating Tucker Stephens. Tucker is smart and always noticing things other people might miss. His knack for observation and deduction has earned him the nickname "Sherlock" from his friends—and I must admit, that makes me smile every time I write it. Like Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and Agatha Christie, I had so much fun crafting my own detectives who have to rely on both their wits and their hearts to solve a case.

If you love reading mysteries (or even just figuring out puzzles and patterns), I hope this story becomes a favorite.
