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





Why Sora? "eBooks significantly impact literacy outcomes"





eBook significant effect size on vocabulary and phonological awareness



Why Sora? "audio books support literacy engagement & enjoyment"

- 2 in 5 (44.5%) children and young people said that listening to an audiobook or podcast has got them interested in reading books.
- 3 in 5 (61.0%) children and young people agree that listening to audiobooks helps them understand a subject
- 3 in 5 (64.7%) children and young people agreed that when they listen to stories they use their imagination more than when watching videos.

- Train Students to use Sora Student Presentation 1 Student Presentation 2

 - THIS is CRITICAL for building reading motivation
 - Build sora collection from student data
- Survey teachers classroom curricular needs




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

Build a lesson plan to support students while reading Sora book


DURING YOUR READING

- At the beginning of each new chapter, think about what happened in the last chapter and make a **prediction** about what will happen next. Highlight the title (or first word) of each chapter in **GREEN** and add a note. In the note, type the letter "P" and then describe what you think will happen next.
- Each time you find a word you don't know, use the **define** feature to learn what it means.
 Then, highlight the word in **YELLOW** and add a note. In the note, write a sentence using this new word.
- While you're reading, think about how the book makes you feel. Pick one sentence in each chapter that made you feel a certain emotion. Highlight the sentence in PINK and add a note. In the note, write the emotion you felt. (Add an emoji if you can!)
- At the end of each chapter, create a one-sentence summary about what happened in the chapter. Highlight the
 last word of the chapter in GREEN and a note. In the note, type the letter "S" and then type your summary to
 remember for later.



School Wide Strategies

- Build Sora (reading) time into daily master schedule
- Be inclusive, reward classes instead of individuals
- Reading challenges
